

Austria Loses Her Illusions.

Sure Disaster Ahead for Monarchy.

Recent events and political speeches in England are causing anxiety and alarm in Austria and Hungary. The newspapers are full of comment on Great Britain's attitude.

Count Clam Martinic, who was an intimate friend of the murdered Archduke Franz Ferdinand, declares that the time has presed when Austria can have any illusions as to the im mense quantities of guns and munitions which the British factories are producing.

He admits than the new British troops are receiving perfect instruction. and that the determination of the people to make every sacrifice surpasses all expectations. He adds that the recent speech of Mr. Lloyd George cannot, therefore, be regarded as so much

Daring Discussions:

The Geneva correspondent of the Daily News" adds that sandwichmen carring posters on which fervent appeals for peace figure are parading

daily in the streets of Vienna. Peace discussion in newspapers reaches during lengths. The "Arbeiter Zeitung" urges Count Czernin, the new Foreign Secretary, to use all his energies to dissipate the nightmare of war which weighs on the people. The newspaper adds: "The statesman who brings us peace will gain all that glory which statesmen who brought us war failed to gain."

A Separate Peace?

Discussing the question of a separate peace with the Allies, the "Morning Post" Budapest correspondent says that in the Monarchy it is agreed that a separate peac with England, France, Russia, and the two Balkan Statesleaving Montenegro out of the question altogether—would be impossible for many reasons. The mere prospect of such a peace, however, would compel Germany to resign all of her aims and ambitions, and get such a peace, jointly with the Monarchy, as would be obtainable under the circumstances.

A separate peace, or even a tendency towards it in Austria Hungary, would spell disaster both for Austria-Hungary and Germany, just as serious dissensions among the Entente Powers would be detrimental to the latter. Hope in New Emperor.

ruin and ultimate collapse. While, often after waiting hours one gets therefore, a separate peace means disaster, the carrying on of the war means a still greater disaster.

Apart from the horrors of starvation and military collapse, it would involve an increase of German influence within the Monarchy and the ultimate disintegration of the Monarchy itself. It follows that the only possible course open to the Austrians and Hungarians. is to compel Germany to conclude & joint peace such as would be acceptable to their enemies.

It is generally recognised that the Emperor Charles, after he has been crowned in Hungary and has taken the oath to the Constitution in the Austrian Parliament, will take the matter in hand and try to re-establish peace. There is little doubt that he will use his influence with Germany in as friendly a way as possible to carry out his intentions, and that if this influence should fail him be will use other kinds of pressure to bring Germany to her

Armies Intermingled.

A separate peace, then, however desira le it may be when the need for peace is so urgent is considered impossible for the present at least. In the first place the technical difficulties would be tremendous, as the armies of the Central Empires are intermingled on almost every front. Disunion at

the fronts would mean disaster. The withdrawal even of a portion of the forces would set free the lines to the enemy, unless guarantees against such a contingency could be secured behind Germany's back and this would simply mean mutiny, as most of the Austro-Huugarian forces are at present under German command. A political move towards a separate place while the army was unable to withdraw would be useless.

The question of peace rests with the Allies, but a refusal will hit Austria-Hungary in a vital point, and the Monarchy will be compelled to put pres-ure upon Germany such as she will not be able to endure for long.

wish to go to Gratz, but it is not wise to go, for grave disorders frequently occur. The shops there have been pillaged, and the cafes and bakeries have not a single pane of glass intact. Since yesterday the place has been in a state of siege. You cannot imagine the condition of the country."

An official Austrian circular issued in September says: "We have succeeded. in resisting until the second harvest under the hardest conditions. The Ministry cannot allow the present moment to pass without calling attention to the unremitting tenacity of the eneiny in its determination to achieve our economic annihilation, and the people are urged to practise the most rigid economy, realising that the situation is -likely to grow still worse, rendering necessary the extremest efforts of the will to enable us to resist."

Rations by Fifteenths.

Innumerable letters from soldiers contain phrases such as the follow-


ing:"We have eaten nothing for two "They have given us food enough

for 10 men and there are 150 of us." A Bohemian officer writes: "Yesterday we went to obtain food, but found there was no bread, and were told that all was exhausted. Instead of bread we got torren's of rain, in which we were half drowned."

Another Bohemian officer writes: * My companions are growing thinner daily. Hunger is our inseparable com-

panion " A Landsturm soldier says: "Our moral is vanishing rapidly, on account

of hunger and suffering. Official documents state that Germany is not able to spare any more munitions, that the Austrian munition factories lack raw materials, and that the Austrian shells are becoming increasingly ineffective because they are badly made.


How Armenians were Exterminated

The evidence available of the attempt of the Turkish authorities to exterminate the Armenian people has been obtained hitherto mainly from Armenian refugees, American Consuls and missionaries and, in cases, from missionaries of German race. Mussulman testimony has been cited at second hand, and could not, therefore, be expected to carry the weight with the Mussulman world that would naturally attach to firsthand reports of reliable Moslem eye witnesses.

We have now received the personal narratives of two such Musulmans, whose former official standing is known to us, and whose veracity we have carefully tested by personal examina-tion. We append the gist of their reports, which necessarily cover only the occurrences which they themselves witnessed or heard of in their neighbourhood, and therefore relate only to a small portion of the atrocities actually committed.

Killed on the March. In August, 1915 (relates the first eyewitness), I saw in the suburbs of Mush large numbers of dead bodies of Amenian men, women, and children lying in the fields. Some had been shot, some stabbed, and nearly all horribly mutilated. The women were mostly naked. In the same month 1 saw about 500 women, girls, and children, guarded by gendarmes, in a camp outside Bitlis. The gendarme said that these people were being deported, but that the orders were to let the "Shotas," or bands of Kurds, Turkish gendarmes. and criminals, deal with them on the way. The bands had been organized by the Government for the purpose of nassacring the Armenians. At Bitlis I saw a number of Armenian bodies floating in the water. Some had been washed up on the banks. The smell was terrible and the water undrink-

In the same month of August, at about two hours from Zaart, I saw masses of Armenian bodies piled up in two ravines. I estimate the number at about 15,000. I learned that the Armenian Bishop of Zaart had not been killed with the others, but had, at his (Continued on page 7.)





PUBLIC HEALTH Time was when Bangkok possessed an unenviable reputation for unhealthiness, and the reports emanding from those foreigners who had the temerity to visit Siam were of a sort little likely to induce others to follow their examp le But whatever may have been the conditions in the past, the Anunal Report of the Bangkok Nursing Home, and the fac s elicite I at the meeting of the Committee of that excellent Institution which has just been held, prove that matters have changed for the better very greatly and that a repetition of statements alluding to former times would be a distinct libel on the Bangkok of the present day. There are those who maintain that the trend of modern civilisation is in the wrong direction, and that its tendency is to develop and exploit the material and grosser side of things with a midirected euthusiasm that entails the neglect of the spiritual and nobler side. We agree that there is a certain amount of institleation for this opinion, but no reasonable individual would be vain enough to suggest that the world is as yet in anything but a very 'imperfect and transitory stage. But though there is no need for us to starve the higher part of our nature and alllow it to sink into atrophy, it is very necessary that, in order for it to have full scope, it should be given a thoroughly healthy vehicle through which to operate; and, whatever may be the shortcomings or the misdirected aims of modern civilisation, it certainly cannot be accused of not expending its best efforts towards this desirable end. At no period of earth's history as it is known to us has sanitary science approache l within measurable distance of that stage to which it has attained in our era, and the results have been so marvellous and so fraught with benefit to mankind that many places hitherto deemed absolutely inimical to ! the normal percentage of disease and deaths. The science of to-day has proved itself capable not only of turning the waste places of the earth into fields of abundant fruitfulness, but of exorcising the demons of insalubrity from regions over which they had hitherto held undisputed sway, and by the magic of its power rendering those are as healthful and favourable to man's existence as any other. We co not think it is saying too much to affirm that Bangkok now is as salutary a place, from this aspect, in which to live as any in the East. On this point the residents have the testimony of their own experience wherewith to satisfy. seventeenth Ordinary General Meeting themselves that our contention is warranted by the facts. And if it be so it is entirely due to the enlightened id-as and the praiseworthy labours of the Government, which has consistently sought to raise the Sizmese capital above reproach or suspicion in this connection. They have reaped the reward they deserve, and Bangkok has per cent. per annum on the cost value entirely lost, except amongst the ignor- annum on the cost value of launches, notoriety which once was attached to its name. The reforms which have been carried out here so ably and to such admirable purpose will eventually be extended until the whole country is embrace I within their field of operations; but much time must necessarily elapse ere the scheme can be carried out in all its fulness. However, as the old adage puts it. Rome was not built in a day, and we are well content to know that all that can be done is being





Air Warfare on the Western Front.

Losses in December.

Owing, no doubt, to the suspension of fighting on a large scale, and also to the recent bad weather, the number of aeroplanes destroyed or driven down in a more or less damaged condition on the Western battle front was smaller in December than in any previous month since June: In that month 72 British, Fr nch and German machines fell into one or other of these categories. For July the number was 165; August, 189; September, 322; October, 171; November, 112. Last month the number, according to the daily communi-ques from British General Headquar-ters, the French Ministry of War and German Main Headquarters, was 94. Of these 10 were British - admitted

by General Headquarters; 63 were German: 21 were, if the enemy claims are trustworthy, French. There are no means of checking the German claims, because in the first place they are again, as a November, made in the most general terms, no date or place being named in the official reports and. next, because the French Ministry of War does not, like our General Headquarters, acknowledge losses in its Air Service.

The 63 German machines fell-35 to British airmen and 28 to Frenca. Nine of the 35 were destroyed, one came down in our lines, four were driven down out of control and almost certainly wrecked, nine were driven down in a damaged condition, and 12 made forced landings. Practically all the 63 fell in aerial tighting, and it is a fair assumption from the particulars furnished in the French communiqués that a large proportion of the 28 conquered by French airmen were destroyed. The German victories were won partly in air fights and partly by anti-aircraft gunfire, but there is no indication of the respective proportions.

Two of the machines included in the total of 94-one French and one German-were lost as the result of a colli-

sion during a fight. During the month the leading French airmen have achieved a number of new successes. Lieutenant Guynemer has won two victories, making 35 in all, and still keeps his place at the top of the list. But he is closely followed by sub-Lieutenant Nugesser (21), Adjutant Donne (17), and Lieutenant Heurteaux (16), who heads the monthly record with three victories. The French have lost, during the month, the disinguished squadron commander. Germany and Her " Deadly Electric Wire."

In the "Frankfurter Zeitung" of December 31, is a remarkable frontpage article entirled. "The Rhythm of the World War," which contains a veiled warning to the remaining small S:ates of Europe not to oppose the will of Germany. They are admonished not to brush against "the deadly electric wire which protects Central Enrope."
The article is of striking interest read in connection with Lord French's

The author of the article is Professor Friedrich Meinecke, the politico-historian of the University of Freiburgin:-Breisgan. At the conclusion of an historical review of the war, which he, of course, treats as having resulted everywhere victoriously for Germany, Meinecke says:

"It was our situation which dictated our course of action. We, the attacked, had to match against superior physical means our moral, political, and scientific superiority and our foresight. But the war has meantime produced still another eventuality which we can include among its legitimate results. The Murder of a Race.

(Continued from Page 3.) own request, been shot in a cave near

On my way back from Zaart to Mush there were 500 Armenians herded together in a stable near Mush and locked in. Through an opening in the roof the gendarmes threw flaming torches; I saw the flames and heard the screams of the vic ima, all of whom were burn-

ed alive.
At Mush the streets were strewn with Armenian bodies. Whenever an Armenian ventured out he was killed on the spot. Neither the old, the blind, nor the sick were spared.

On the way from Mush to Hinis I saw piles of Armenian bodies at short; intervals in the fields by the roadside. Between Hinis and Sherkis-Keni I saw two ravines filled with Armenian corpses, mostly men. There were about 400 in each ravine. Another ravine was filled with the bodies of little children. At Kara Shuban I saw a large number of Armenian bodies

floating on the river Murad.

This is what I saw. At Erzingan I was told that wholesale mussacres had taken place there, and in the whole country round. Besides those whom the Turks had killed and barnt alive. thousands were thrown into the Euph rates. Many drowned themselves out of fear of a worse death.

An Imperial Order The second eye witness, also a Mu-

sulman, stated:-In April, 1915, an order came from Constantinople to Erzerum, where I was quartered, that the Armenians inhabitating frontier towns and villages should be deported into the interior. I saw large convoys of Ar menians go through Erzerum In May I was transferred to Trebizond. In July an order came that all the Armenians of that vilayet should also be deported to the interior. As I was a member of the Court-martial I knew that deportation meant massacre. Besides the deportation order, an Imperial Iradeh commanded that all deserters, when caught, should be shot without trial. A secret order, however, said "Armenians" instead of "deserters." A "fetva" from the Sheikh ul-Islam accompanied the Iradeh, saying that the Armenians had shed Moslem blood, and that it was lawful to kill them. I heard that all Armenian men were being massacred on their way into the interior. They were lined up on the edge of ditches, prepared beforehand, shot, and thrown into the ditches. The women and children were attacked by organized bands, called "Shotas", plundered, outraged, and murdered. The children, of whom the Government had taken charge, were also massacred. At Trebizond the children, whom the American Consul had taken charge of, were removed, taken out to sea in boats, stabbed, put into sacks and thrown into the sea. Some of their bodies were afterwards washed up on the shore.

In July I was ordered to accompany a convoy of Armenians, the last batch from Trebizond. It consisted of 120

men, 700' children, and about 400 women. I took them to Gumishkhaneh. Here the men were removed and, as I heard afterwards, all killed. I was ordered to take the women and children to Erzingan. On the way I saw thousands of unburied Armenian bodies. Several bands of "Shotas" met us, and asked me to hand over the women and children to them. I refused. I did leave about 200 children with Moslem families, who were willing to take care of and educate them. From Erzingan I was ordered to go to Kamach, where, however, the authorities refused to take charged of the women and children. I became ill, but was told that as long as the Armenians were alive I should be sent from one place to another. Finally my batch was included in another batch that had come from Erzerum in charge of Mohamed Effondi of the gendarmerie. He told me atterwards that on leaving Kamach in the Enphrates Valley a band of "Shotas" stopped the convoy, ordered the escort to withdraw, and then shot every Armenian and threw the bodies into the

At Trebizond Moslems were warned that they would be liable to the death penalty if they sheltered Armenians. The best looking women were picked out by Government officials, outraged, and murdered.

At Kamach I saw in prison the Kurdish chieftain Murza B y I asked him why he was there. He said, "I have killed 70,000 Armenians, and now they have arrested me for striking a gendarme." He was afterwards secretly executed.

In reply to a question as to the reason for these massacres this eye witness stated that they were ordered as a part of the settled Young Turkish policy of exterminating the non-Turkish races of the Ottoman Empire. The motive was political, no religious, It was inspired by the "Pan Turanian idea." He saw no Germ in officers actually connected with the massacres, but the German military authorities in Turkey knew of them and made no attempt to stop them.-Ex.


Spectacle for Bukharest.

Hongkong and Shanghai Banking Corporation.

The Report of the Court of Directors of the Hongkong and Shanghai Banking Corporation for the year ended 31st December, 1916, has now been issued. The net profits for that period, including \$3,027,219.89, balance brought forward from last account after president. ward from last account, after paying all charges, deducting interest paid and due, and making provision for bad and doubtful accounts and contingencies, amount to \$10,165,665.16. A sum of \$500,000 has been transferred, on the recommendation of the Directors, from the Profit and Loss Account to credit of the Silver Reserve Fund, which Fund now stands at \$18,500,000. \$750,000 have been written off Bank Premises Account, and \$600,000 allowed for depreciation in securities. After making these transfers, deducting the Interim Dividend of £2.3/- per Share, paid on 14th August last, and Renumeration to Directors, there remained for appropriation \$5,821,187.55. Out of this a final Dividend of £2.3/- per Share is being paid, also a Bonus of Ten Shillings Sterling per Share, and the balance of \$3,166,578.85 has been carried to New Profit and Loss Account.



Submarinism and World's Shipping.
