Netherlands News.

A German Protest. .

The Hague, October 10 .-- According to Wolff's Bureau, Germany has protested to the Netherlands Government against the internment of four aviators and the wounding of one of the aviators at the mouth of the Scheldt. Diplomatic negotiations have commenced already. The German rendering of the occurrence reads that one of the seroplanes, on account of fire in the motor, landed near to, but not in Dutch territorial waters, but that, on anchoring, the anchor fell into Dutch waters. The Dutch land batteries promptly commenced to fire and the dydroplane was interned. When the plane was missed at Zeebruggen, other aviators ascended and one of them came down into the water, prior to the commencement of negociations. The Dutch torpedo boat, however, was outside territorial waters. When the hydroplane wished to ascend, it was followed by the torpedo boat which wounded one of the occupants. The dydroplane was caught, and the aviators were interned, not withstanding their pro-

The Provision of Coal.

It is officially announced that the negociations between Holland and Germany conce ning the provisioning of coals and a suitable arrangement of other economic questions have led to a temporary result. This result awaits the approval of both countries, cons quently the negociators have left for Berlin. In the mean time, arrangements are being made for the transport of coals to Holland.

Mines Off the Dutch Coast.

On the morning of the 8th, a mine exploded at Zandvoort and caused great damage to the Boulevard where the windows of all the houses were broken and those in the back stree's as well. The Orange Hotel suffered serious damage, the Kurhaus less. There were no casualties. There are more mines on the coast.

During the month of September, no less than 414 mines were washed ashore on the Dutch coas and, since the commencement of the war, 2,633 have come to land.

In connection with the German pro st concerning the interning of German aviators of whom one was wound-

ed at the mouth of the Scheldt, the Goverment of the Netherlands has officilly denied it. The Government maintain that the German aviator landed 2,900 metres within the frontier line, which was indicated by trisologred buoys flying a tricologred flag. The second plane, without any necessity, came 3,500 metres within the frontier line, as observed by two boats of the Dutch Mercantile Marine which were lying at anchor.

A Frontier Question.

The Chamber of Commerce ar Delfziji requested the Minister for Home Affairs to take up the question of the rectification of the frontier between Germany and the Netherlands on the River Ems, because Germany regards the whole of the river as German territory which is much to the disadvantage of Dutch navigation and trade, whereas the extension of the Delfzijl har-

bour is not necessary. Freights Trains. The "Handelsblad" understands that the railway companies intend to put & stop to the transport of all goods by train to places situated on the sea, such as Amsterdam and Rotterdam and, in the future, to transport all vegetables by steam and motor boats. The goods trucks and required for the transport of coals from Germany, as German trucks are not available. 3,000 trucks are required monthly.

The Germans in Belgium.

Disregarding all international conventions bearing her signature, Germany persists in perpetrating the most blood-thirsty excess in Belgium. The Dutch papers affirm that the German authorities at Liege have condemned to death a well-known merchant, M. Groneret, his wife and two daughters of 20 and 14 years old, on the pl-a of espionage. The father and mother mother were both shot at the same time. The daughters were compelled to stand by and witness the death of their parents. The officer in attendance, commanding the soldiers ordered for the execution, told the girls that their lives would be spared if they consented to denounce their parents' accomplices, but they formally declined to do so. The elder of the two was immediately shot, and she fell lying across her parent's bodies. A similar offer was then made to the younger girl, but likewise met with a refusal, upon which she was tortured, and then shot.

Victoria Cross Heroes.

Stirring Deeds by British Soldiers.

London, Oct. 17.—Further stirring stories of heroism are related in the Gazetter in announcing the names of nine new Victoria Cross winners.

One of the most striking is that of Private Harry Brown, late Canadian Infantry. A strong enemy counter-attack had captured a position and caused a very critical situation, all wires being cut. It was of the utmost importance that headquarters should be informed of the position. Brown and another soldier were given a message and ordered to deliver it at all costs. The other messenger was killed, and Brown had an arm shattered, but he proceeded through an intense barrage until he reached close to the support lines, where he was found by an officer.

"Important Message."

Brown was so spent that he fell down the dug-out steps, but he retained consciousness long enough to hand over his message, saying "Important message." Then he became unconscious, and died a few hours later. His devotion to duty was of the highest possible degree imaginable. The successful delivery of the message undoubtedly prevented the temporary loss of the position and many

casualties. Sergeant Frederick Hobson, Caradian Infantry: During a strong enemy counter-attack, a shell buried a Lewis gun in a forward post, in a communication trench leading to the enemy lines, and killed the crew, except one. Hobson, though not a gunner, grasping the great importance of the post, rushed from the trench, dug-out the gun and got it in action against the enemy, who were advancing down the trench and across the open. The gun jammed. Hobson, though wounded, rushed at the enemy and held them back single-handed with bayonet and clubbed rifle until he was killed by a rifle shot. Meanwhile the surviving gunner had repaired the gun, and reinforcements shortly afterwards arriving, the enemy were beaten off. Hobson's valour and devotion to duty saved a most serious situation.

Smothered a Grenade. The remaining recipients are all of British regiments, including Sergeant John Carmichael, North Staffords, who in order to save his comrades placed his steel belmet over a burning grenade and stood thereon. The granade exploded and blew him out of the trench, seriously injuring him. This splendid act of resource and self sacri-

fice undoubtedly saved many men. Lance Sergeant John Noyney, Irish Guards: Although surrounded by the enemy, without water and with little food, he held, with fifteen men, an advanced post for 96 hours. On the morning of the fifth day, a large force of the enemy advanced to dislodge him. He attacked the enemy, bomb ing and machine-gunning them with great effect. Being surrounded by su perior unmbers, he led back his men in a charge through the enemy, reaching a stream between the post and line. He and a private covered the retirement of the remainder across the stream. When the whole of his force was safely across, Moyney himself crossed under a shower of bombs. His endurance, skill and devotion to duty enabled him to bring the entire force safely out of

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

Victoria Cross Heroes.

Stirring Deeds by British Soldiers.

London, Oct. 17 .- Further stirring stories of heroism are related in the Gazetter in announcing the names of nine new Victoria Cross winners.

One of the most striking is that of Private Harry Brown, late Canadian Infantry. A strong enemy counter-attack had captured a position and caused a very critical situation, all wires being cut. It was of the utmost importance that headquarters should be informed of the position. Brown and another soldier were given a message and ordered to deliver it at all costs. The other messenger was killed, and Brown had an arm shattered, but he proceeded through an intense barrage until he reached close to the support lines, where he was found by an officer.

"Important Message."

Brown was so spent that he fell down the dug-out steps, but he retained consciousness long enough to hand over his message, saying "Important message." Then he became unconscious, and died a few hours later. His devotion to duty was of the highest possible degree imaginable. The successful delivery of the message undoubtedly prevented the temporary loss of the position and many casualties.

Sergeant Frederick Hobson, Canadian Infantry: During a strong enemy counter-attack, a shell buried a Lewis gun in a forward post, in a communication trench leading to the enemy lines, and killed the crew, except one. Hobson, though not a gunner, grasping the great importance of the post. rushed from the trench, dug-out the gun and got it in action against the enemy, who were advancing down the trench and across the open. The gun jammed. Hobson, though wounded, rushed at the enemy and held them back single-handed with bayonet and clubbed rifle until he was killed by a ritle shot. Meanwhile the surviving gunner had repaired the gun, and reinforcements shortly afterwards arriving, the enemy were beaten off. Hobson's valour and devotion to duty saved a most serious situation.

Smothered a Grenade.

The remaining recipients are all of British regiments, including Sergeant John Carmichael, North Staffords, who in order to save his comrades placed his steel helmet over a burning grenade and stood thereon. The granade exploded and blew him out of the trench, seriously injuring him. This splendid act of resource and self sacrifice undoubtedly saved many men.

Lance Sergeant John Noyney, Irish Guards: Although surrounded by the enemy, without water and with little food, he held, with fifteen men, an advanced post for 96 hours. On the morning of the fifth day, a large force of the enemy advanced to dislodge him. He attacked the enemy, bombing and machine-gunning them with great effect. Being surrounded by su perior unmbers, he led back his men in a charge through the enemy, reaching a stream between the post and line. He and a private covered the retirement of the remainder across the stream. When the whole of his force was safely across, Moyney himself crossed under a shower of bombs. His endurance, skill and devotion to duty enabled him to bring the entire force safely out of

Disappearing Coppers.

The mysterious disappearence of copper coinage from circulation continues to engage the attention of the authorities. It is now quite common to be given postage stamps in change in shops, while booking clerks and tramway car conductors sternly refuse to give change, although it is they who receive the largest number of small coins.

Marseilles municipality was long ago obliged to issue cardboard pennies plated with aluminium, and it is now announced that the grocers in the Department of Lotet Garonne has adopted half-penny tickets.





THE BALTIC OPERATIONS.

The news from Russia during the week hes been very scanty but what little has come through shows that things appear to be growing worse The abandonment of the port of Riga with its stores and resources is a terrible blow and it is no wonder that there have been great rejoicings in Germany in consequence. Reval has been abandoned and the islands of Oesel and Dago are now in the hands of the foe who may ose them as bases for further operations in the Baltic. The one cheering item of news is that the Russian warships that were bottled up in Moon Sound have safely rejoined the rest of the fleet in the Gulf of Finland. The menace to Petrograd undoubtedly exist; but is perhaps not so great as is supposed. Between Riga and the capital are deep swamps and a series of lakes and these have been utilised in the military defence scheme. Riga undoubtedly affords the enemy a splendid base for winter quarters but with the winter rapidly approaching he is not likely to commence an immediate march on the capital. In the meanwhile there does not appear to be any sign of order arising out of the Russian chaos. Soldiers are still false to their oath and desert in the face of the enemy and the conflict between rival factions still goes on. In spite of this the Russians are still optimistic of the outcome of the Revolution. They complain that the other Allies are too impatient and expect things to settle down too quickly and that after such a great upheaval a period of chaos is but natural. There is no doubt, however, that the weakness of Russia is causing the war to be prolonged for if the Russian people had been able to sustain their part of the burden the Germans would not be where they are to-day. That the Russians are so long in setting their house in order is due in great measure to their peculiar temperament. The Russian is to a great extent a fatalist and where an Anglo-Saxon would arise and straighten things out he is ready to sit down and let things take their course. Great erises such as the present are often necessary to the progress of a nation and it may be that the realisation of the gravity of the present situation will cause the Russian people to moderate some of the foolish notions that have wrought so much havec among them. If may have the effect of making the contending political parties drop their differences and support the Government in its stupendous task of restoring discipline in the army and order in the country. The brightest spot in all the dull surroundings of the present is in the Middle East where the Russians hold nearly all their conquests in Armenia and a notable and inspiring feature is that the Turks have not seriously fought the Russians in the Middle East since

last winter.

PHRA Nondha Mondhadul, lately Judg . of the Court of Mondhol Sarushdra has been appointed Senior Crown Advocate of Mondhol Patani.

LATEST advis: The Pathanakorn and Pathanarem announce the changes programme for the week end. E. M. Pereira will hold an auction sale on Saturday the 3rd November in Sapitoom Road.

THE remains of Mrs. Cheong Fook Yoo, the wife of the well known Cantonese merchant in Bangkok, were taken for burial this afternoon. The funeral was largely attended the procession of carriages and motor-cars extending from the British Legation to the Phathanakorn Cinema.

BRITAIN's first supply of standard boots for civilians will be for winter wear and it is expected that they will be on sale in the shops in October. Specifications will be submitted early next month to the Government Committee in charge of the matter, and prices will then be fixed. There will be several grades. There is no intention of making standard boots compulsory for everybody. The main idea s to ensure for those who cannot afford high prices serviceable winter boots at reasonable cost —(Ex.)

A DELEGATE of the Australian miners, whose name is reproduced in the French press as H. Bengteson, has published a remarkable statement respecting the manner in which Germany even in war time is flooding the world with bogus precious stones through agents in neutral countries. German specialists, he says, have succeeded in counterfeiting sapphires, rubies, diamonds and opals. False rubies sold at c. 12 per carat and sent to India bave been resold in Paris at f. 400 to f. 500. It is clear that dealers in precious stones throughout the world should be on their guard against these German frauds.

An already briefly reported by telegraph, Herr Mathias Erzberger, the fiery young Wurttemberg Roman Catholic politician and Papal peace intriguer has been severely punished for trying to popularise Germany's no-annexations or indemnities "bluff." He has been deprived of the principal source of his income by being ignominiously retired from the board of directors of the great "Deutscher Kaiser" Mining Company, owned by "King" August Thyssen, the multi-millionaire steel and iron magnate. Thyssen, like most of the Rhenish industrial barons, is a Roman Catholic and used Erzberger in the Reichstag for the promotion of political and business schemes at home and abroad. As the German industrial world eagerly covets the rich tron ore in the Briey basin (Eastern France) and the coal and iron fields of Belgium, Erzberger's action in esponsing "no annexations" is naturally looked upon as high treason to his Rhonish masters, and he is now cut off from their pay and powerful favour. (Ex.)

The Prize Court.

Claimants' Petition of Dika.

The following is the text of the petition of Dika put in by the Representative and the master of each of the vessels condemned by the Prize Court.

The Petition is addressed direct to His Majesty in keeping with the usual custom of petitions to the Dika Court.

May it please Your Majesty:

We, Mr. H. Schungel, Representative of the Norddeutscher Lloyd of Bremen and Mr. Captain of s.s. the defendants begunest humbly to be allowed to lay before Your Majesty the following

1.) The Prize Court delivered judgment on the 25th of September 1917, condemning the German steamer... as a good and lawful prize of the Orown. The Judgment is

prize of the Orown. The Judgment is in our opinion inconsistent with the provisions of the Hague Convention. We respectfully beg to appeal against this judgment for the following reasons:

2.) The Attorney-General asked the Court to condemn the German s/s
. captured on the 22nd of July 1917 in the Menam Chao Phya by an Officer of Your Majesty's Navy as a good and lawful prize.

3.) The Defence pleaded that the capture of the German merchant ship registered at the port of Bremen—by an Officer of Your Majesty's Navy is contrary to the Hague Convention and the Declaration of London

a) it has been executed before the official proclamation of war was presented and as

b) the usual time was not given to the ship to leave Siamere waters c) It is contrary to the Hague Convention to declare as lawful prizes ships which are in harbour at the commencement of hostilities and which are not

allowed to leave.

4.) The main points of the judgment are as follows:

What we contend is that the capture is illegal, having been executed before a state of war existed between Siam and Germany. The Royal Proclamation relating to this declaration of war is dated the 22nd of July 1917 and as in Siam the day has always been officially reckoned, up to the 10th of September 1917, as beginning after 6 o'clock in the morning, it is evident that the time of capture preceded the time of the proclamation of war. This is a point of Law on which the Court has not in our opinion dealt with

London, Oct. 18 .- In the House of Hume Williams, said that the Government had continually pressed Turkey to improve the British prisoners. It cannot be said that improvement has resulted. A large number of ablebodied prisoners, however, had been transferred to working camps on the Bagdad railway, east of Aleppo, to work under the railway construction company, while the Netherland Minister in Constantinople has been able to make arrangements for better feeding and clothing as it will be in the company's interest to maintain the health of the prisoners. It is to be hoped that the change will be for their benefit. London, Oct. 19 .- The War Cabinet's congratulations to Field Marshal Haig and the vote of thanks to be moved in Parliament are regarded as marking the end of the campaign in the west for the year, confirming the view of Reuter's headquarters correspondent cabled yesterday morning. Occasion is taken by the papers to review the results of the campaign, as arduous as any hitherto fought. The German view that because the territorial gain is relatively small therefore the offensive has failed, is scouted. It is pointed out that the campaign of 1917, if it has not ended the war has decided it, completely reversing the positions. At the end of 1917 the British, besides holding the heights commanding the plains of Belgium, lave inflicted such losses on the Germans that the resisting power of the enemy has fatally and irrevocably weakened.




OFFICIAL PHOTOGRAPH TAKEN ON THE BRITISH WESTERN FRONT An officer of an Irish Regiment in full German Kit.

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
