From Literature to Film and Television Dramas

Literature not only provides entertainment but also records history. Therefore, film and television dramas that are adapted from literature offer greater opportunities for audiences to appreciate the past.

Si Phaen Din reflects Thai lifestyle and society from the reign of King Chulalongkorn, Rama V, up to the reign of King Ananda Mahidol, Rama VIII. Khu Kam gives a glimpse into the crisis of World War II and the unbridled love between two people of different nationalities. Bupphe Saniwat takes viewers back to the reign of King Narai the Great of the Ayutthaya Period, thereby showing not only ordinary people's way of life but also the historical backdrop of the relations between Siam and France.
